THE UKRAINE WAR

What Implications for International Order?

November 6 (Mon), 20:15 - 21:30 (Japan Time) / 11:15-12:30 (UK Time)

Political and International Studies (POLIS), University of Leeds, and Graduate School of Law, Doshisha University organize a seminar “The Ukraine War: What Implications for International Order” by Prof. Edward Newman on November 6, 2023. All the undergrad / graduate students including prospective Leeds-Doshisha DDP students are cordially invited.

Abstract

The Russia-Ukraine war has brought full-scale armed conflict to Europe, against a historical background of difficult relations between the two countries directly involved and wider regional tension. This war also has global implications. It is a key juncture in a changing international order, in which there is increasing polarization between the 'West' and other countries. It is a challenge to liberal international principles and institutions, and has de-stabilized the nuclear order. It is a threat to the international rules-based system, including the role of international organizations. It threatens economic globalization. And it threatens to make regional conflicts more challenging. This lecture will explore these themes. It will also consider what international responses to the Russia-Ukraine war tell us about the nature of the ‘international order’ in an increasingly multipolar world.

Lecturer: Prof. Edward Newman



Edward Newman is Professor of International Security in the School of Politics and International Studies at the University of Leeds. His work explores international order, intrastate armed conflict and civil war, theoretical security debates, and international state recognition. He is co-editor of the *European Journal of International Security*, a journal of the British International Studies Association published by Cambridge University Press; a founding Executive Editor of the *International Relations of the Asia Pacific*, a journal of the Japan Association of International Relations published by Oxford University Press; and founding co-editor of the *Routledge Studies in Civil Wars and Intra-State Conflict* book series. In the past, he was a United Nations official, working in the United Nations University based in Tokyo for almost a decade.
